Many are aware of the enormous contributions **Arthur C. Danto** '48 has made to contemporary art through his writings on philosophy and criticism. The 'artworld' as it has become known was first defined by Danto as a means to explain how Andy Warhol's Brillo Box of 1965 was a work of art. However few know Danto as a successful artist with a decade-long career that preceded his tenure as one of the most highly regarded philosophers of our time. Recently, to much excitement worldwide, recognition of his art making is being revived. Spurred by an exhibition at the University of Illinois in 2009 that revisited Danto's work as a printmaker, arrangements were made soon after for the entirety of his personal work, the Danto Master Print Collection of both prints and the woodblocks themselves, to become part of Wayne State's University Art Collection. His gift of this body of work, 87 prints and 46 woodblocks, makes WSU the world's foremost resource for scholarly research into the career of Danto as an artist.


Danto, who grew up in Ann Arbor and studied fine art at Wayne University (now WSU), achieved considerable success in New York City as a printmaker from the early '50s, exhibiting at the Art Institute of Chicago, the Detroit Institute of Arts and the National Gallery of Art. Following his solo exhibition at NYC's Associated American Artists gallery in 1960, Danto gave up art making and turned his interests exclusively to philosophy and art criticism. Danto is the Johnsonian Professor Emeritus of Philosophy at Columbia University, and, from 1984 to 2008, was the art critic for *The Nation*.

At Wayne State on October 15, Professor Stanley Rosenthal and the printmaking program of the James Pearson Duffy Department of Art and Art History, partnering with the University Art Collection, presented the Arthur C. Danto Printmaking Open House and Demonstration. Funded through a grant from WSU's Research **Enhancement Program (REP)** in the Arts and Humanities, this event was free and open to the public to experience the production of art prints in a professional print shop atmosphere and to

learn about the various techniques and methods of printmaking. Guests witnessed the creation of two special editions of Danto woodcut prints, *The Writer Herbert Gold*, and *Bull*, which now are available for sale to benefit the newly established Arthur C. Danto Printmaking Scholarship.

Upon completion of the Danto Master Print Collection, the University Art Collection will create a special online exhibition of the work, which will include an essay written by Danto as well as essays by WSU graduate students in philosophy and art history, examining links between the artwork and philosophy of Danto.





Mondays at The Max with Wayne State

Epic two-parter punctuated 48th Hilberry season

In April, the Hilberry Theatre Company once again presented a theatrical work of epic proportions, **John Irving's** The Cider House Rules, Part I: Here in St. Cloud's and The Cider House Rules, Part II: In Other Parts of the World, adapted by Peter Parnell.

The Hilberry has presented works of epic theatre in the past with productions of The Kentucky Cycle and The Life and Times of Nicholas Nickleby. The Cider House Rules is made up of two complete plays that span more than eighty years in the lives of the characters. Productions of this magnitude are produced at the Hilberry only once a decade. Epic productions that are performed in repertory over several weeks are rare in most regional theatres, where artistic choices are reduced to small cast plays. The Hilberry Company, however, is uniquely positioned to take on projects of this scope and size; in fact, in today's economy, a production like The Cider House Rules, which consists of a cast of 22 actors, might be seen only in a theatre such as the Hilberry and on a campus such as Wayne State's.

"We're fortunate to be able to tackle these big stories that unfold in exciting and dynamic ways over time," said Director Lavinia Hart. "The resources and dedicated personnel provided by our theatre program and our audiences make the project possible." Hart has directed other epic productions at the Hilberry. She received 2004's Wilde Award for "Best Director" for *The* Kentucky Cycle.

Music bridges far-flung, very similar, cities

In early May, Wayne State University's Department of Music, along with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and the Royal Theatre of Torino, Italy, presented Detroit Torino Urban Jazz Project II in Torino, Italy. WSU Professor and Director of Jazz Studies, Christopher Collins, sax, Emanuele Cisi, sax, and Furio Di Castri, double bass, performed in concert with the Filarmonica '900 del Teatro Regio (Royal Theatre Philharmonic Orchestra). Newly commissioned music pieces by WSU Distinguished Professor James Hartway and Carlo Boccadoro were featured.

Enhancing the lives of young musicians and expanding the bridge between the two strikingly similar communities of Detroit, Michigan, and Torino, Italy, concert offerings by the Detroit Torino Urban Jazz Project sold out three months in advance. This is similar to selling out a venue like Detroit's Orchestra Hall. The concert advances Wayne State's and Detroit's growing presence in the city of Torino where, among other recent developments, author **Valentino Castellani** released in the spring his new book Detroit or Torino which includes an interview with Detroit Mayor **Dave Bing**.

Contemporary Ballet, for their first Detroit summer intensive, July 24-29. The Complexions Detroit Summer Intensive was developed with the intention of making the complete dancer by guiding the dancers to achieve their full potential in the exclusive style of Complexions Contemporary Ballet.

Artistic Directors **Dwight Rhoden** and **Desmond Richardson**, both former stars with **Alvin Ailey** and recently featured on TV's So You Think You Can Dance, led the intensive, along with Complexions company members. Via the directors' expert guidance, students were taught the Complexions technique and samples of company repertoire. Also included were yoga, hip hop, pilates, gyrokenisis and auditioning classes. An informal performance concluded the intensive, all in the spacious Maggie Allesee studios in Old Main.




During the winter and spring 2011 terms, the Department of Communication hosted Academy Award winning film editor **Richard Chew** as the inaugural Bob Allison (Allesee) Endowed Chair in Media Arts.




Chew visited campus in late January to present a public lecture at the DIA's Detroit Film Theatre titled Film Editing: The Invisible Art and he returned in residence as a visiting faculty member for six weeks during the spring term. The January 27 program included an announcement of the endowment with an acknowledgement of

donors **Bob and Maggie Allesee**, a conversation with Richard Chew preceded by a highlight reel of his work, and a screening of one of the films that influenced his remarkable career: Nothing but a Man (1964) starring Ivan Dixon.

In the spring, Chew taught two master classes, affording students in film-related disciplines the unique opportunity to learn from and interact with one of Hollywood's master editors. He also returned to the DIA's Detroit Film Theatre to host a series of four screenings titled Double Features with Richard Chew at which, on each night, a pair of films were shown; first an earlier, classic title that heavily influenced a film of Chew's, followed by that later film of his. The series paired the film Breathless with Chew's I Am Sam. The Graduate with Chew's Risky Business, Medium Cool with Chew's Bobby and The Bicycle Thief with Chew's One Flew Over the Cuckoo's











LOTS of Art! is a chance to let the imagination soar. Volunteers for LOTS of Art! have the opportunity to work closely with neighborhood groups and artists experienced in community arts projects.

The College of Fine, Performing and Communication Arts is proud to participate in the ArtsCorpsDetroit's LOTS of Art! during the summer and fall of 2011 and to offer grants of up to \$1500 per lot to CFPCA faculty, staff, students and alumni who create a LOT of Art!

ArtsCorpsDetroit invites proposals, on a rolling basis, from Wayne State affiliates. In conversation with local neighborhoods, ArtsCorpsDetroit is developing opportunities for collaboration between ArtsCorpsDetroit volunteers and neighborhood groups, identifying particular parcels of residential property where collaborative efforts will beautify a local neighborhood and add to the vitality of the community.

Life is good here in Midtown

On March 1, in the McGregor Memorial Conference Center, Wayne State hosted a town hall meeting kicking off "Live Midtown," a program that provides eligible WSU, Detroit Medical Center and Henry Ford Health System employees with incentives to buy or rent a Midtown residence or refurbish the exterior of an existing Midtown home. It's part of the three institutions' "15 by 15" campaign, an effort to bring 15,000 young, educated residents to the area by 2015.

Live Midtown was embraced rapidly, quickly trending in the regional zeitgeist. Local and national media outlets declared "Midtown shines" (Crain's Detroit Business), "Midtown Detroit: the city's hippest new neighborhood" (CBS News), "Cool factor lures the young, artsy to Detroit" (*The Detroit News*) and "Detroit pushes back with young muscles" (New York Times). Only eight months later, nearly all of the fund designated for the program's first year has been claimed. Its huge success spawned a similar effort, organized by institutions and businesses stretching from Fox Town down to Hart Plaza, titled "Live Downtown."

As the cultural gateway between the university and its surrounding neighborhoods and business districts, the College of Fine, Performing and Communication Arts always has been at the center of Midtown Detroit's repurposing, revitalization, beautification, entrepreneurial fearlessness, street



She is one of a few artists to share their cultural talents, vision and expertise in order to foster greater dialogue and understanding between people of the U.S. and Jerusalem. In addition to a Kresge Fellowship in 2009, she was awarded the Saxe Prize by the Contemporary Jewish Museum of San Francisco and received a commission from the Jewish Museum, New York. Works by Avadenka are included in the 2011 books *Masters Book* Arts: Major Works by Leading Artists published by Lark Press of Asheville, NC, and Livre Anime du Papier au Numerique published by Editions l'Harmattan of Paris. She returned to Wayne State in April to offer an art book assembly demonstration session in the art department as part of the city-wide Art X Detroit festival. In December she conducted a lecture titled "Printing Matters: 30 Years of Land Marks Press" at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Hornak, a draughtsman and painter, taught in the art department 1966-67. During the first half of his career, he was known for the creation of multiple exposure landscapes, paintings that were reminiscent of double exposure photographs. By the

mid-1980s, his work evolved into highly stylized still life paintings that were influenced by the work of the 17th and 18th century Dutch and Flemish masters. Hornak died on Dec. 9, 2002, at the age of 58.




