

Dumesnil Scholars Wayne State University



\$4.4 million gift endows WSU music's **Evangeline L. Dumesnil Scholarship**

Dumesnil Scholars are Wayne State music majors recognized for their musical talent and academic excellence with the Evangeline L. Dumesnil Scholarship. Since 1991, this scholarship, supported by the Evangeline L. Dumesnil Trust, provided more than \$1.7 million in tuition support to nearly 350 undergraduate and graduate students.

To further support Wayne State music students, the Dumesnil trustees decided this year to dissolve the trust and contribute its principal to create the Evangeline L. Dumesnil Endowed Scholarship in Music. The resulting gift of \$4.4 million is an investment both in the future of Wayne State and the musical heritage of Detroit.

"I am excited and grateful that the Evangeline L. Dumesnil Scholarship will become a permanent source of support and recognition for our outstanding music students," said Dean Matthew Seeger. "Our music students have committed themselves to developing and sharing their talent and creativity, and the Dumesnil Scholarship will help ensure their education is not a financial burden."

Evangeline L. Dumesnil, known professionally by her maiden name of Evangeline Lehman, was an accomplished composer and singer who loved to teach. Many of her works for voice and piano were performed across the globe. Lehman also

performed as a soloist with prominent orchestras in the United States and Europe. She received

an honorary doctor of music degree from the Detroit Institute of Musical Arts before passing away in 1975 at the age of 78.

Today Evangeline Dumesnil continues to teach the next generation of Detroit musicians through her investment in student scholarships. A musician's livelihood is rarely

guaranteed. Scholarships allow music students to pursue their talent and passion and ease their financial concerns. "Without scholarships, I probably couldn't have come here," said

Dumesnil Scholar Kimberly Allen '14. Allen is earning a master of music in performance and plans to teach advanced violin students in the future. Her sentiment is echoed by Dumesnil Scholar Paul Bishop '11 '13 who earned a master of music in composition. "It meant a lot to me that faculty members were recognizing my efforts as a student," Bishop said about receiving the scholarship. "It made me feel like somebody believes in me. I want to try to compose as much as I can."

Ziegelmueller forensics fund reaches \$1 million

Thanks to the loyalty and commitment of Wayne State's debate and speech alumni, the **George Ziegelmueller** Endowed Fund for Forensics recently reached \$1 million. The forensics program at Wayne State is comprised of a debate team and a speech team that are consistently ranked in the top 50 nationally. The program rose to national prominence under the guidance of former director Dr. George Ziegelmueller, an icon within Wayne State's forensics program and the debate community at large. During his 48-year tenure as forensics director, Ziegelmueller built a nationally recognized program that competes successfully against the likes of Harvard and Northwestern.

It is an uncommon accomplishment for a fund with many individual donors to reach the \$1 million mark. This fund supports Ziegelmueller's commitment to opportunity. Scholarships and guaranteed travel funding allow students to join the debate and speech teams regardless of their financial situations. With the average forensics student spending 20 to 30 hours each week preparing for competition, working a part-time job is difficult. Senior debate team member Jake Justice believes the program's financial support contributes to students' success at national competitions. "When you're not worrying about how you're going to pay for many expenses, you can focus on

WTVS, launched its second season. In addition, the college has been closely involved in the DPTV show Detroit Performs and helped create a "college life in Detroit" episode of WTVS's series Discover the D. We initiated several projects with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and continue to stage our Mondays at the Max with Wayne State series at the DSO's Max M. Fisher Music Center.

Outreach and engagement are part of what makes our college so unique and rich, and here too we are growing and expanding. Last summer the Hilberry's production of the children's play Cinderella, or It's OK to be Different launched Wayne State's inaugural Detroit Youth Theatre and Dance Journey season, touring eleven Detroit public elementary schools and three local festivals. Detroit Urban Debate, a partnership between the Department of Communication and Detroit Public Schools has never been bigger. Student fine artists received awards from the Freudenberg company and were able to exhibit their works in a show at Freudenberg's North American headquarters. String Project@Wayne, a top youth string education program nationwide, continues its excellent work teaching string instruments to elementary age children in the city.

"Dr. Ziegelmueller is a mentor, supporter, educator and friend to students and colleagues. Anyone who worked with him was touched by his intellect and sense of humanity."

At age 83, Ziegelmueller no longer attends forensics events, but he is no less a part of the Wayne State program. Almost every member of the forensics program, past and present, says the same thing about the team: it's like a family. Contributing to the forensics endowed fund is a way for alumni to honor their Wayne State family and secure the program for future generations of students.

George's son Bill Ziegelmueller will be the featured quest at this year's annual DSR/TKA Forensics Dinner and Awards event, May 10, 2014, at WSU's St. Andrews Hall.

Burns endowment supports journalism

Professor Benjamin J. Burns was a legend of local journalism. He was a former executive editor of The Detroit News and was head of the journalism program in the Department of Communication where he spent two decades turning students into professional reporters. Many of them went through the Journalism Institute for Media Diversity, which Burns helped found at WSU in 1984.



Burns died September 7, 2012, at his Grosse Pointe home, of acute myeloid leukemia. In his honor, his wife **Beverly** Burns, along with friends and alumni, established with CFPCA the Ben Burns Endowed Scholarship for Excellence in Journalism. The scholarship recognizes scholastic achievement, encourages continued progress and provides assistance to students in financing their education.

Senior journalism major Daniel Dumas, a student in the lournalism Institute for Media Diversity, is the inaugural receipient of the scholarship and said it helped open up a world of opportunities to him. "It has allowed me to have experiences I never thought I'd have as an innner-city youth growing up in Detroit," said Dumas.










WSU Art Collection and Eastern Michigan University collaborate on Cass Corridor exhibition

The art exhibition Subverting Modernism: Cass Corridor Revisited 1966–1980 is a multi-year collaboration between the Wayne State University Art Collection and Eastern Michigan University. It examines the art activity of a group of artists working in the late '60s and '70s in the Cass Corridor area of Detroit near Wavne



State University. Curated by Dr. Julia R. **Myers**, professor of art history at EMU, the exhibition consists of 35 paintings, sculptures, prints and photographs, 26 of which are from the Wayne State University Art Collection

In the late 1960s, revolution was in the air in Detroit, with radical leftist activity focused in the Cass Corridor. Feeling the revolutionary spirit, local artists also broke with tradition by overthrowing Modernism, the dominant New York art critical theory of the post-WWII era, and ushering in the Post-Modernism pluralism seen throughout American art in the 1970s.

Subverting Modernism confronts the conventional wisdom that these Cass Corridor artists, as they have come to be called, were essentially "urban expressionists" responding to the decay and danger of post-industrial Detroit, a thesis most thoroughly set forth in *Kick Out* the Jams, a 1980 exhibition at the Detroit

Institute of Arts. Subverting Modernism. a much-needed scholarly reappraisal of this art movement, debunks this notion, positing instead that each Cass Corridor artist created his or her own individual styles and meanings, cross-fertilized at times by the work of his/her fellows.

While early pieces in the exhibition push hard at the boundaries of Modernism/

Minimalism, other works break forth from these limitations to create meanings of great universality, such as our need for shelter or the persistence of the life force, both human and otherwise. Many of the works speak of Detroit, both in its industrial and post-industrial stages, but they also encompass and transcend the specifics of time and place and address issues that have significance for all humans, such as violence and vulnerability, the presence or absence of order and structure in nature and human life, and our millennial old desire to make music and dance.

A 100-page catalogue published by Eastern Michigan University Gallery and distributed by Wayne State University Press, allows art lovers to see Detroit art that is not usually accessible to the public. Dr. Myers's extensive research — interviewing the artists, consulting hundreds of newspaper articles from the late 1960s and '70s and using archival materials in both Washington D.C. and Detroit — makes for a thoroughly new look at the exciting work of these important Detroit artists.

ability to vision. Metalsmithing, sculpture and foundry classes defined my artistic voice and challenged me to look inward when creating art.

"Music is an integral part of all of our lives and the City of Detroit has such a storied musical history."



"There's a growing body of research that links childrens' music making to increased language development, math ability and improved school grades. Through *Playing It Forward* we hope to ensure that all children at Detroit Public Schools have an opportunity to explore their musical talents and perhaps nurture the next Motown star."

The instrument drive was widely publicized and quite successful. Donors dropped off their used instruments on multiple dates in June at both the WSU main campus and at WSU's Oakland Center. The instruments were serviced as needed and the CFPCA board made them available to DPS students in time for the 2013-14 school year. A second round of *Playing it Forward* is in development.

'It is an amazing and humbling honor to serve as your president of the CFPCA Alumni Association Board of Directors. I would like to share this honor with the faculty and mentors of the college who have encouraged, defined and sculpted my artistic walk.

"The Department of Art and Art History curriculum of classical arts expanded my curiosity of process and materials while developing the most powerful tool for any artist: the

"In the winter of 2009, Art History Topics in the Community, taught by Professor Marion lackson, accelerated my studio art practices with a twenty five hour internship at the internationally acclaimed Heidelberg Project. The staff of that east side art community in Detroit became my mentors and assistants for the construction of two public art sculptures and a meditation garden on vacant lots on Heidelberg and Mt. Elliot streets. Together, we learned masonry craft while constructing the first sculpture, the Mona Lisa. Constructing the second sculpture, Mayan Sun Clock, we engineered a working clock. The third element of this multi lot transformation would change an overgrown forest into a tranquil mediation garden. I'm celebrating four years at the Heidelberg Project where I am curator in residence.

"After graduating in 2012 my artistic work led me to elevate my artistic vision within my own Southwest Detroit neighborhood. Dr. Shaun Nethercott, founder of the Matrix Theatre, ArtsCorps Detroit and I are collaborating on the design and construction of a Mayan courtyard, sculpture park and Mayan amphitheater. I volunteer for the non-profit Urban Neighborhood Initiatives organization, transforming public


spaces and vacant lots, beautifying public parks and designing future public art works.

Ne state Wayne State magazine, Chronicle of Higher Ed., shared in arts appeal

The university's alumni association devoted an entire issue of its awardwinning magazine to the arts at Wayne State last spring. The magazine overviewed aspects of our programs in art, film, media arts, music and theatre and dance. Also featured were full-page profiles of CFPCA alums art historian Dora Apel '89; choreographer Garth Fagan, Hon '06; filmmaker Marianne Jeney '06; recording artist Sixto **Rodriguez** '81; operatic tenor **George Shirley** '56; actor **Jeffrey** Tambor '67; choreographer Sonya Tayeh '02 and voice actor Ed Victor '81.

At the same time, Chronicle of Higher Education visited CFPCA in the course of generating a report on declining funding of the arts across the U.S. Studying the arts programs of several universities around the state of Michigan, the Chronicle extrapolated that, to the nation at large, college campuses have become the center of the arts in America. 

Polito and his partner, Craig Bentley, recently moved back to the Detroit area after living in New York City for 20 years.

Charles Postlewate '69 '73 and his wife Marisa traveled to Montevideo, Uruguay to translate and edit the book Don Andrés and Paquita, The Life of Segovia in Montevideo by Alfredo Escande about the life of the premier classical guitarist of the twentieth century, Andrés Segovia (1893-1987), and his second wife, concert pianist **Paquita Madriguera** (1900-1965). The book received excellent international recognition, being described by reviewers as fascinating, a brilliant success, a must-read book and a magnificent page-turner. Prior to moving to Kalamazoo, Luscombe was the University of Michigan School of Music's assistant to the dean, and the first performing arts coordinator of the Michigan Council for the Arts. He was a recipient of the Governor's Arts in Education Award, Wayne State's Distinguished Alumni Award, Art Serve Michigan's Arts Advocate and Educator of the Year awards, and was a lifetime, honorary member of the Michigan Dance Council.

Gilbert Maddox '54 '59 '61 '70 died January 12, 2013. A native Detroiter, he was a trailblazing broadcaster and educator as well as historian. As a writer, producer and moderator, Maddox was one of the earliest contributors to a sustaining presence of African Americans on Detroit television. In 1968 he served as executive producer of CPT, the predecess to Detroit Public TV's current series Detroit Black urnal. From 1969 to '76 he hosted and co-produced Journal. From 1969 to 76 he hosted and co-produced 350 half-hour episodes of *Profiles in Black*, which aired on WDIV-TV 4 in Detroit. Dr. Maddox taught in the Detroit Public Schools before holding faculty appointments at Wayne State, Howard University, University of Michigan, Michigan State University, University of the District of Columbia and Morgan State University.

John "Jack" Morin '67, a well-known San Francisco Bay area psychotherapist specializing in sex therapy, died in June 14, 2013, at age 67. The eech communication alumnus was an author and lucator and maintained a therapy practice in Hayes Valley, CA. He also had a passion for photography. Morin was an influential teacher and thinker in the sexuality and psychotherapy communities nationally and worldwide. Sex educators and therapists have been influenced by him and his work for over 30 vears

Yvonne Newnan, donor to CFPCA, died June 28, 2013, at age 90. She was preceded in death by her husband Dr. **Henry Newnan** '68 '72. In 1998 the Newnans made a gift to the university that enabled renovation of the lobby of the Hilberry Theatre and its upstairs conference room. Thereafter, the space was named the Dr. Henry and Yvonne Newnan Lobby of the Hilberry Theatre. Newnan was a former manager of the Republican State Central Headquarters in Lansing, maintained a lifelong love of music and was an accomplished pianist.

Detroit weatherman, died Nov. 16, 2012, at age 91, at his Farmington Hills, MI, home. A former World War II pilot and prisoner of war, Eliot appeared on *The Lone Ranger* and *The Green Hornet* radio programs. He also appeared on with Marvin "Sonny Eliot" Schlossberg '59, beloved dio programs. He also appeared on children's ograms, quiz shows and commercials. Eliot's oadcast career took off on television, where he ted a 17 year series on WDIV-4 Detroit titled

At The Zoo. Éliot was most famously known for his comedic weather reports, he delivered the weather on WWJ Newsradio 950-AM Detroit for more than

60 years. Throughout his career, Eliot earned a number of awards and honors including the Michigan Association of Broadcasters Excellence Award for Broadcast Personality in 1998. He was inducted into the Michigan Association of Broadcasters Hall of Fame in 2002 and the Michigan Journalism Hall of Fame in 2005

Helen Thomas '42, former head of the White House press corps, died July 20, 2013, at age 92. From an immigrant family on Detroit's east side to the front row of the White House press corps, Thomas paved the way for women in journalism. She was the first woman to be an elected officer She was the first woman to shouse Correspondent and president of the White House Correspondent Association and the first to be accepted into the journalists' Gridiron Club. She also became the first female White House bureau chief for a wire service when United Press International named her to the when onited Press international named her to the position in 1974. "She covered nine presidents as White House correspondent, an achievement I don't think anybody has ever matched," wrote Professor Jack Lessenberry, head of the journalism program at Wayne State, in Detroit *Metro Times*. "She worked tirelostly ached bard tirelessly, asked hard questions and held their feet to the fire. She always made time for young reporters, and always was proud to say that she was from Detroit."

Jimmie D. Trent, former WSU professor of speech and debate, died Feb. 20, 2013. Trent was a nationally recognized debater and debate coach. After completing his doctorate in 1966 from Purdue University, and serving on the faculty at Eastern Illinois and Wayne State, Dr. Trent served as profess and chair of the Department of Speech and Theatre at Miami University of Ohio for decades. He was author and editor of numerous journal articles as well as the books *Concepts in Communication* and *Writing*

Sherman Anson Wilson '30, former professor of photography at Wayne State, died in February 2013 at age 104. Wilson retired from the university after 47 years. He was a member of Trinity Episcopal Church in Lexington, MI, and the Lexington Masonic Lodge. He is survived by his wife, his son and five grandchildren.

Sheila Yancy '92 '11 died in November 2012 of a rare form of stomach cancer known as Gastric Stump Cancer (GSC). Yancy was a staff writer for the Times Herald in Port Huron, MI, and the Michigan Chronicle, and co-author of And the High Places I'll Bring Down, a biography of Bishop **William L. Bonner**. Her articles appeared in African American Family magazine, the Detroit Free Press and Christian Covenant News. She was nder of This and That Creations, an assortment of handmade crafts, and The Sugar Lump Collection, a line of greeting cards, bookmarks and poems. She earned a bachelor's degree in WSU's Journalism
